BJORNSSON, SVEINN, President of Iceland; born Feb. 27, 1881, in Copenhagen; son of Björn and Elisabet (Sveinsdóttir) Jónsson; educated at Reykjavík College, 1900; University of Copenhagen (Law) 1907; married Georgia Hoff-Hansen, Sept. 2, 1908; six children - Björn, Anna, Henrik, Sveinn, Olafur, and Elisabet. His Excellency began his career in 1907 as Advocate to the Superior Court of Iceland; Advocate to the Supreme Court of Iceland, 1920; Icelandic Minister to Denmark, 1920-24; Advocate to the Supreme Court of Iceland, 1924-26; Icelandic Minister to Denmark, 1926-41; Regent of Iceland, 1941-44. He served as Special Envoy to the United States of America, 1914; Special Envoy to London, 1915; Head of the Icelandic Delegation at the Genoa Conference, 1922; Conference for United Europe, Genova 1929 and 1930, Conference for Codification of International Law, The Hague 1930; And Tthe Monetary and Economic Conference in London, 1933; Conference for Mesh and Fishing Regulations, London 1938. Delegate for Iceland in the International Council for Study of the Sea from 1938 to 1944; Special Envoy for Iceland in negotiating commercial treaties with Norway, Great Britain, Spain, Germany, Italy and Greece. Among orders and distinctions conferred upon him are the Grand Crosses of all the Scandinavian nations, the Gold Medal of The Icelandic Millennium Celebration, the Gold Medal of the Icelandic Scandinavian Society, etw.
