

DEANE W. MALOTT  
President, Cornell University

Deane W. Malott became the sixth president of Cornell University on July 1, 1951, after 12 years as chancellor of the University of Kansas.

A native of Abilene, Kans., Mr. Malott attended high school there before taking his undergraduate work at the University of Kansas, where he helped pay his way by part-time work and received a bachelor's degree in 1921. He earned a master's degree at Harvard Business School in 1923.

He remained at the Harvard Business School as assistant dean from 1923-29 and was an associate professor there from 1933 until his election as chancellor at Kansas in 1939. Between 1929-33 he was a vice president of the Hawaiian Pineapple Company in Honolulu.

Mr. Malott is a former president of the Association of Naval ROTC Colleges and Universities and of the National Association of State Universities and has also served as secretary-treasurer of the Association of American Universities. In 1943-45, he was educational adviser to the Operations Analysis Division of the U.S. Air Corps. Washburn University (Topeka, Kans.), Hamilton College (Clinton, N.Y.) and Bryant College of Business Administration (Providence, R.I.) have awarded him the honorary degree of doctor of laws.

In 1949, accompanied by Mrs. Malott, he went to Norway to speak to university and research groups on the organization of research in the United States, and to India as a delegate to the India-American Conference sponsored by the Indian Council on World Affairs and the American Institute of Pacific Relations.

For several weeks beginning in **March**, 1953, he served as a special consultant to the National Security Council, the top policy-making group for foreign affairs and national defense.

He is a director of General Mills, Inc., the B.F. Goodrich Co., Pitney-Bowes, Inc., Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corp., the Citizens Bank, Abilene, and the First National Bank of Ithaca, N.Y.; a director and member of the executive committee of the Midwest Research Institute; a trustee of the American Foundation for the Blind, the Teagle Foundation and Corning Museum of Glass; a member of the business advisory council of the U.S. Department of Commerce; a member-at-large of the national council of the Boy Scouts of America, and a councilor of the National Industrial Conference Board.

His writing includes texts and general works on agricultural marketing and agricultural industries, public utility management and corporation finance.

He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa scholastic society, Beta Theta Pi social fraternity and Sigma Delta Chi, Delta Sigma Rho, Beta Gamma Sigma, Alpha Kappa Psi, Kappa Delta Pi and Phi Delta Kappa honorary and professional fraternities.

Mrs. Malott was born and raised in the Hawaiian Islands and is a graduate of the University of California. She is a member of Gamma Phi Beta sorority.

The Malotts have three children.
