

Review

Operational definition. Discursive genre with a dual purpose: firstly, to describe the parts that make up the work (artistic, literary, scientific, sports, and so on); secondly, to assess the topic and its approach. In some manuals, it is called a commentary. The recommended length of a review is between 300 and 500 words.

Structure elements

- Introduction: reference to the topic, the central idea of the work reviewed and information about the context of the publication.
- Development: description and structural analysis of the work reviewed.
- Conclusion: theme summary, author's information, and assessment of the main idea (the latter is optional).

How is this done?

- 1. Review the work to get familiarized with its theme and structure; if necessary, go through it more than once.
- 2. Analyze it under the premise that the readers do not know the work, but they want to know about it; Take notes of all aspects involved and the way they are related: sections, place of publication, theme, theme development, and the relationship with other texts or events.
- 3. Prepare a visual organizer which will allow you to have a global vision of the work you are going to review.
- 4. Add your insights and personal reflections on the global theme.
- 5. Prepare an outline or index of ideas.
- 6. Develop your ideas and integrate them into paragraphs.
- 7. Give your review a title; typically, the title of a critical review is the reference index card of the work reviewed.
